# From the desk of Acting District Principal Vivian Searwar.....

Ey Swayel, Pepiyel tel skwix. Ey tel sqwalewel kw'es Stó:lō Temexw. Hello all. My name is Vivian Searwar. I am happy to be here on Stó:lō territory, this land rich with mountains, cedar trees, rivers and rain.

I am humbled and honoured to be working in the role of Acting District Principal of Aboriginal Education with Mission Public Schools, and fortunate to be part of the Siwal Si'wes family.

I would like to extend a warm welcome to learning partners new to Siwal Si'wes. We have Aboriginal Liaison Workers, Jacob Firlotte, Tiffany Bishop & Rhea Paul, Indigenous Student Success Coaches, Katy Brookes and Donald Cosens and the Halq'eméylem teacher at the middle schools, Camielle Laslo. We appreciate the hard work that you have already done within Siwal Si'wes and with the Indigenous students whom we all serve. To the returning members of the Siwal Si'wes family, we are grateful that you are with us for another year. This year the Elders have chosen the Wolf, or HUMILITY as the Sacred Teaching. The chosen artwork was designed and painted by SD75 student artist, Alicia Desjarlais, whose ancestors originate from Sunchild First Nation, Rocky Mountain House, Alberta. Mr. Joe Heslip, former District Principal of Aboriginal Education in Mission commissioned Alicia to paint his drum. Alicia researched animal totems and their meanings. She felt the character traits of the wolf represented Mr. Heslip. The acceptance that all beings are equal is to capture the spirit of humility. The expression of this humility is manifested through the consideration of others before ourselves. The wolf bows their head in the presence of others out of deference, and once hunted, will not take of the food until it can be shared with the pack. Their lack of arrogance and respect for their community is a hard lesson, but integral in the Aboriginal way.

Alicia says, "When I am doing an art piece, I'm in my own world, and I feel at peace. Art is very healing for me and something I've always enjoyed doing. I am very proud of the work I did on the drum. This has inspired me to carry on with my artwork. Knowing that people believe in me has made a difference in my life. Young people are watching. Believe in us and love us, it matters and makes a difference".

Thank you, Alicia for your powerful words and for giving us permission to use your exemplary artwork to represent this year's sacred teaching!

# HALQ'EMÉYLEM—Pipte (Peter Lindley)

Ey swayel mekw' wat. This year I've been appointed to teach the Halq'eméylem language at Dewdney, Deroche, Hillside Traditional, Cherry Hill, Hatzic, Albert McMahon, and Silverdale Elementary schools. An additional responsibility is to provide weekly Halq'eméylem classes for students participating in the Summit Education Program at Silverdale elementary on Friday afternoons. This program also provides me opportunity to share local cultural knowledge and offer support and guidance to reinforce and complement subject materials for these families. With the combined efforts of principal Rob Clark and Aboriginal Liaison Worker, Marla Mulholland it's become a win, win situation for us all.

I would like to take a moment to mention one of my most personally satisfying programs. This is the second year I've had the privilege of gathering weekly with many of the most enthusiastic, genuinely happy and willing group of drummers, singers and dancers at Albert McMahon. We've established a trust relationship where we're comfortable and willing to learn from each other as we simply enjoy our time together.

Each month our students have something special to look forward to. Our first major undertaking involving district wide efforts is our "Annual Orange Shirt Day". The orange shirt has become the official symbol acknowledging impacts of the Indian Residential Schools. Students gathered on September 30<sup>th</sup>/19, at Fraser River Heritage Park to remember those forced to attend Residential School, many never returning home alive as well as honour those who survived to continue their healing journey. The message on the shirts, "MEKW' STEWIQWELH SHXW-ELI" (*Every Child Matters*) needs to be read, understood, supported and defended.

This year, I was asked to drum an honour song and share some words on the contributions of Canadian Aboriginal Veterans at Hatzic Middle School's Remembrance Day assemblies. For me, this was the ideal opportunity to showcase our Indigenous student hand drummers and singers. With the support and guidance of Aboriginal Liaison Workers, Rachel Schooner and Jenny Snow, the students came together and practiced to prepare to perform two songs. This also allowed me to include Leq'á:mel First Nation, Mike Kelly who is a proud family member to a long line of military servicemen to share his story. The hand drummers and singer's performance were from their hearts. They stood proud and confident, voices loud, strong and clear, drumming was soothing and controlled. It was a proud, proud moment for us all.

# Albert McMahon Elementary—Jennifer Sherif—Aboriginal Liaison Worker

I love working at Albert McMahon and am happy to be back again as the ALW there this year!

Many classes at the school, gearing up to our federal elections, had me in to present on Indigenous governance. We looked at the diversity and similarities between Aboriginal communities/ groups in what their governance looks like in action. The students had some amazing insights to share on what virtues they think effective and fair chiefs and non-Indigenous community and government leaders should possess to meet the need of their communities. We will continue in many classes to work on self-governing concepts for individual classrooms and to produce charters based on a given class's needs. We will work hard to build on our circle work throughout the year.

Albert McMahon has some very creative students, and some of them will be helping to make giveaways for this year's Winter Heat event on December 5<sup>th</sup> at the Friendship Centre. We have come up with some ideas, and are starting to put them into action! This day of community giveback is a wonderful one, started by Marne Ferris, current Aboriginal Liaison Worker at HPMS, several years ago. Two grade six students from AME will join two students from my other school, Dewdney Elementary (determined by the outcomes of a mini essay application), to go to the Friendship Centre that day to help. We have so many kind, diligent grade six students at the school, and it will be wonderful to see them put their skills and kindness to use to better the greater Aboriginal community! This is also a great time to reflect and act on this



year's teaching of Humility.

Our noon hour beading club has begun, and is going great! There will be an after-school program starting soon (a letter will be sent home with details and start date), which will focus on enhancing literacy using fun activities through an Aboriginal lens, so please stay tuned.

The healthy eating program is going again at AME this year. Each week, the Aboriginal room will be equipped with healthy snacks for students working in the room, or those who pop by at

recess or lunch if they need a little something extra to fill their tummies. We are very

lucky to have received some donations from London Drugs and Superstore here in town to help support this program.

I can't wait to see what the rest of the school year brings at this great school!



#### Cherry Hill Elementary School—Susan O'Soup—Aboriginal Liaison Worker

Welcome back to all our new and returning students of Cherry Hill Elementary. This year we are focusing on literacy at Cherry Hill Elementary. September and October are the months of the Wolf at Cherry Hill and the teaching is Humility. The teaching honors the virtue of the animal that are necessary for a full and healthy life. I taught in some classrooms on humility and the students were introduced to the important role the wolf plays in the teaching and Indigenous heritage through the recommend reading of an Indigenous Author. After the reading on humility, the students made a bracelet.



I have also taught on Indian Residential Schools of Canada with grade 5 & 6 classes. September 30, 2019 was our annual Orange Shirt Day March at Heritage Park. We had two classes who went to the march and some parents. Before the march, I went into the Grade 5/6 class to have students fill in a word or write a sentence on Indian Residential School on a card stock cut out of the wolf. The wolf is the animal from the Seven Sacred Teachings and the wolf means humility. The teachers took the card stock cut outs of the wolf to Heritage Park and we gathered and gave to Elders who attended the March at the park.



We had the honor of having Jacob Firlotte come to Cherry Hill Elementary to teach drumming & the use of cedar to grades 1 to 4. Students and staff loved having Jacob Firlotte at our school.

We had an art show on How Raven Stole the Sun by Three Crow's Production.

We also had a pumpkin carving contest for Halloween and a costume parade through our hallways and we do student recognition for Respect.

Christine Morrison Elementary celebrated Stó:lō New Year once again. Malila provided teachings to classes which included the Halq'eméylem names of the moon cycles. Teaching was also given regarding why the Stó:lō celebrate the New Year in the Fall season. This is "time for things to be finished" - called "temhila'lxw". Because this season is called "time for things to be finished", now, something new is going to begin. Students also learned about Inuit Blueberry Management. Part of the celebration included dried blueberries, and baked bannock and jam prepared by some of our amazing PAC parents – it was of course enjoyed by all!



# ABORIGINAL VETERANS DAY



Our focus this year was the contributions made by the Cree Code Talkers. Cree code talkers were an elite unit who were given the responsibility of developing a coded system based on their language for disguising military intelligence. *The language they had been forbidden to speak, ended up being a vital contribution in winning the war*. Their code was virtually unbreakable. We have included a picture of the National Aboriginal Veterans Monument. There are many Aboriginal Veterans who have helped protect peace and freedom over the years. To honour them, the National Aboriginal Veterans Monument was unveiled in Ottawa in 2001. It has a large eagle on top, four men and women from different Aboriginal groups in the middle and sculptures of a grizzly bear, a caribou, a wolf and a bison around the outside. These animals have special symbolism in many Aboriginal cultures. I am very happy to be back as the Aboriginal Liaison Worker at Dewdney Elementary this year, where we have been busy! In October, were very lucky to have 'Tipi Tony' join us again for the annual tipi raising that happens here, just past our wetlands area. Tony spoke on his tipi teachings, and was here for the whole day, with students assisting him with the busy work, from doing a grass dance to flatten the land, to placing cedar mulch, etc. Our principal Jordan Klassen was busy that day, too, doing – among other things – the weed-wacking (clearing) of the area in some very special work boots! We were very fortunate to have local Metis Elder Sam Green join us for part of the day. Sam spoke at the ceremony, inspiring us with her words on harmony, stewardship for the land, and the importance of our school community working as a family to take care of each other, the tipi and the land.

Also in October, and particularly around the Thanksgiving holiday, some classes did work inspired by Monique Gray-Smith's book "My Heart Fills with Happiness". We took time to have sharing circles, and do some art, based on the people, places and things that fill our hearts with happiness. It was

wonderful to hear, as it always is, what is in the hearts and minds of our kids when it comes to their 'inner spark'.



We honoured and acknowledged Aboriginal Veterans Day both in our school-wide Remembrance Day assembly on Nov. 7, as well as with a picture board of Aboriginal people who contributed, and continue to contribute, to peacekeeping and defending others in various wars and battles. We were honored to have Sq'éwlets Chief Johnny Williams open our ceremony.

Students at Dewdney who choose to, will soon be participating once again in the Aboriginal Friendship Circle noon hour program. This year, we will be focusing on a reading club (using Aboriginal-themed content, and works by Indigenous authors), storytelling and writing, in order to enhance students' skills in fun, interactive ways. More information will be going home with students very soon

We are also gearing up for Winter Heat. This event takes place at the Friendship Centre here in Mission, and is a wonderful opportunity for students to give back to the Aboriginal community. Students will be working with me to produce giveaways for the big day, and two grade six students will be selected (based on a mini essay application) to join us that day at the centre.

We have been getting to know the new students and catching up with returning students. We would like to take this time to welcome Camielle Laslo our new Halq'eméylem teacher, and Katy Brookes our new Indigenous Student Success Coach.

This year has been off to a busy start. Students have participated in the yearly Orange Shirt Day event at Heritage Park. All Indigenous students were given the opportunity to attend and after the event students wrote messages on wolf cut outs that will later be used to create an art piece that will be displayed at the School Board Office.



Cans for Candy!! We traded candy for nonperishable food items that will be used to create food hampers for local elders within our community. The kids had a great time decorating boxes and helping us collect food for our elders.

The students actively participated in interactive workshops and cultural teachings on the traditional, ancestral, Unceded and shared territory of the Kwantlen, Leq'á:mel, Matheqwi, Qwó:ltl'el and Sq'éwlets First Nations. They shared their knowledge, demonstrated their teamwork skills and learned about new ways to communicate what they have learned about themselves and others to increase their positive impact in the world. These leadership workshops and programming were developed by community members as well as our districts' partnership with ME to WE. We have much gratitude and appreciation for the delicious lunches that were provided by each local band that we were visiting. The students appeared to feel empowered as young leaders within our communities and shared some new ideas of how they were going to create change. At the end of the day, the students communicated that they enjoyed spending the day connecting and learning.

We have several events coming up for our students that we are very excited about. From November 19<sup>th</sup>-21<sup>st</sup>, students will be at the Newlands Golf and Country club for the Strengthening the Circle Leadership Conference. Our students have the opportunity to learn about Indigenous culture through guest speakers, workshops, and spending time with our Elders and teachers.
